# Sunbeam bread neon sign toasted a \$1,600 bid

BRIGHTON, Mich. — Big Cheese Productions recently hosted an auction that offered a selection of dazzling and unusual items. This sale featured neon and custom-made signs, advertising globes, life-size statues, tire ashtrays, and other petroleum-related collectibles.

There were metal signs and neon signs, including a mixture of newly created custom art and vintage pieces. The highest bid of the sale was for the original vintage Sunbeam Stroehmann Bread advertising sign with neon added. The description read "a spectacular piece, especially in person! Looks great with neon turned on and off". It was a full

canned neon sign, which meant it was completely encased in metal with no cords or transformers exposed. Measuring approximately 5 feet long by 3 feet tall, it left with a high bid of \$1,600. A

handsome blue Oldsmobile Service sign featuring an earth logo was claimed with a final bid of \$275, a Studebaker authorized service neon sign made in the USA finished at \$350, and an eye-catching

round neon sign featuring the Roadrunner holding a helmet ended at \$275.

The counter-culture character Rat Fink was also represented with a new custom neon sign. This hot rod character

# Paint by numbers allow anyone to be Picasso


According to William Bird, Jr., "The paint by number phenomenon began in the fall of 1952 when a now unknown San Francisco bar hobbyist entered a Craft Master still life in a local amateur art contest." The paint by number work entered was a faux-cubist work entitled Abstract No. One. The work won third place, much to the embarrassment of the judges. Americans became infatuated, and the paint by number craze took off. In 2004, a part-time teacher in New York posted a paint by number painting of Queen Elizabeth on eBay, hoping the work would sell for \$15. It didn't. When the auction was finished, the painting sold for \$2.800.

nation in 1953. The artist that filled in the numbers with paint remains unknown, but she did not go out of the lines, and the painting looks fabulous.

Not all paint by number kits are valuable. If you want to search for some kits that are guaranteed to be valuable, certainly look for another Queen Elizabeth, but others of historic people or places would most likely sell for the highest bids. And it helps if the painting was completed as originally designed with the original paint supplied. The term "paint by number" describes art kits that have predesigned art boards or panels on which sketches have been premade in light blue or gray lines. The lines indicate which areas to paint and what paint to use. Each area has a number that corresponds to a small container of paint. The



artist simply applies the numbered paint into the correct numbered spots on the panel.

In 1951, Max Klein and Dan Robbins invented one of the earliest paint by number kits under the name Craft Master. They sold over 12 million kits in its first three years. Craft Master quickly built a fol-


lowing with the catching slogan, "A beautiful oil painting the first time you try."

In the late 1950s and early 1960s, paint by number kits were sometimes marketed as a hobby with health benefits, which was a form of Paint by Numbers "therapy." Advertisements suggested painting



by number increased self confidence, improved motor skills, improved hand to eye coordination, aided in reducing hand tremors, improved concentration, and helped to provide ar-





part of Kustom Kulture for automobile enthusiasts. Roth intended Rat Fink to be an anti-hero to Mickey Mouse. A fan picked up this collectible for a high bid of \$300. The "Weirdos Freaks Wackos and Creeps Anti-Social Club" had an "eye-popping" neon sign featuring their logo. This new 24inch fully-canned round neon sign closed at \$375 while a metal sign with the same logo finished at \$100.

Large figures played a prominent role in this auction. One notable example was a wooden hand carved life-size cigar store Indian clutching a pipe. He was made of solid mahogany with beautiful detail and very sturdy construction. Standing approximately 70 inches tall, this majestic statue left with a final bid of \$800. Another mahogany figure was a beautiful hand carved kneeling mermaid figurehead replica that was carved from mahogany wood in the 1980s. She weighed approximately  $50\ \mathrm{pounds}$  and measured approximately 40 inches tall. This naked beauty finished with a high bid of \$350.

Several items constructed of Fiberglas proved to be popular. A beautiful Fiberglas Indian motorcycle wall mount that measured approximately 75 inches long by 34 inches tall featured a black body with red fenders and gas tank. This incredibly large and handsome artwork closed with a final bid of \$1,400. A colorful Fiberglas wall mount sign featured caricatures of the three Navy veteran Pep Boys Many, Moe, and Jack who founded an automotive aftermarket service and retail chain. It measured 48 inches high by 57 inches wide and also drew a high bid of \$1,400. A more familiar icon was represented with the Big Boy restaurant Fiberglas statue. Listed as a new item, it still brought back memories of meals shared with family. Measuring approximately 43 inches tall, it left with a final bid of \$800. Another new item was the Yellow Bear Alignment (spelled "Alinement on its sign) Fiberglas statue with sign. This eye-catching piece measured about 52 inches tall. A final bid of \$750 claimed this bruin. A pale skinny fellow titled "Alien Up In Smoke" was intended to sit on a countertop of a tobacco store. The custom-made sign reached a final bid of \$200. Advertising glass globes such as the ones seen on gas pumps, both new and vintage, were available. A vintage milk glass American Telephone & Telegraph Co. Bell System advertising globe fea-

tured graphics fired into the glass on both sides. No lights or a base were included. Measuring approximately 8 inches diameter, it left with a high bid of \$120. A new, limited edition Ferrari gas pump advertising globe featured a double-sided globe with vellow glass lenses on a plastic body. This delightful item closed at \$200. Chevrolet Corvette A glass globe reproduction with crossed racing flags earned a final bid of \$180, a sweet "Mickey and Co" vintage Disney Mickey Mouse advertising globe that was double sided with graphics fired onto milk glass finished at \$140, and a licensed Skelly gas pump globe with glass lenses and a dark blue plastic Capco body finished at \$160. A variety of new, attractive metal signs were also available. The bumbling Wile E. Covote was featured on a new die cut sign. This single sided sign consisted of alu-

minum sheets with an alumalite core and the decal featured the hapless covote tied to a rocket, no doubt in pursuit of the Roadrunner. Measuring 30 inches long, this indoor or outdoor made in the USA sign finished at \$210. A sign featuring the Roadrunner confidently standing by at 28 inches tall closed at \$150. The Sinclair Dino was also featured on an aluminum die cut sign that finished at \$130. There were many automotive signs, including an NHRA Championship Drag Racing aluminum die cut sign with graphic decal that finished at \$150 and a Detroit Dragway sign "brand new, made right here in the USA!" for \$120. A sweet Volkswagen guy/ VW advertising new die cut sign created with an alumalite core between aluminum sheets of metal with a UV protected decal stood 30 inches tall and

was claimed for \$130.

numerous ashtrays consisting of small tires with the wheel part replaced by glass or metal trays to hold the ashes. These measured about 6 inches in diameter, represented several brands and styles. and sold in the \$20-30 range. The exception were two balloon tire models. An original vintage Goodyear balloon tire ashtray with an amber glass hubcap sped ahead of the others, earning a final bid of \$170. The second place winner was the original vintage Firestone balloon tire ashtray that had a glass tray in the center that read "Century of Progress Firestone Chicago 1934". # Dime novels were 19th Century's popular paperback

To fill the long hours between marches and battles, soldiers on both sides of the Civil War found ways to amuse themselves. Games like cards, chess, checkers and dominoes were played in the camps of these soldiers, as were athletic events such as boxing, racing on foot and cricket. Soldiers even used cannon balls to knock down rough wooden pins.


Reading was a popular way to pass the time. Soldiers read letters, newspapers, the Bible, and any other printed material they could find. And when possible, these soldiers got their hand on a dime novel.

There was an audience of women for dime novels, too. Many young, working and middle class girls and women enjoyed the stories of romances in the pioneer realm, sensational murder mysteries and society romances.

The first dime novels were initially published around the start of the Civil War by the New York firm of Beadle and Adams. Millions were eventually published between the Civil War and World War I.

These sensational stories were full of romance and adventure and became wildly popular in both the United States and in England, where they were known as "penny dreadfuls." Named for their cheap prices, dime novels were distributed in numerical series at newsstands and dry goods stores for a dime or a nickel apiece. These books were simple in appearance, bound in cheap paper with a brightly illustrated cover. Irwin and Erasmus Beadle's publication of "Malaeska, the Indian Wife of the White Hunter" in June 1860 marked the dime novel's debut. It relates to the tragic tale of a beautiful Indian maiden who follows her heart and marries a white settler. A total of 65,000 copies were sold during the first six months of its publication. The first of these stories were about the American Indian, but when Indians





Dime novels were any of a number of inexpensive paperbacks filled with melodramatic adventure. They were most popular between 1860 and 1915. They often featured a western theme.

Dime novels started out as 4 by 6-inch paperbound pamphlets of up to 100 pages. Later the standard format got larger, 8.5 by 12.5 inches. The books were sometimes as few as 16 pages long.

The target audience of these novels were lower classes, primarily boys and young men, although some groups in the middle class enjoyed the books as well. The sale of dime novels was most highly concentrated in the industrial cities and mill

were placed on reservations the public's fascination with them began to fade. The novels then morphed into stories of cowboys in the Wild West, outlaws and bandits, and train robbers. The entrance of Great Britain and the United States into World War I

provided a whole new field of material from which publishers could draw for the novels.

Because of the cheap price, publishers geared the books toward the uneducated lower class, producing stories with simple plots. Storylines

The dime novel as Beadle designed it was conveniently sized and shaped for the pocket. Every week new dime novels hit the newsstands and general stores. At the beginning of the publishing frenzy, the books were printed on the cheapest newsprint available, lacking color and illustrations. Soon publishers realized that a colorful cover catches the eye and would sell any story, no matter how poorly it was written.

Most of Beadle's early issues were about American history. They had titles like "Bill Biddon, Trapper, or Life in the Northwest," "The Frontier Angel," "A Romance of Kentucky Ranger's Life," "Life on the Old Southwest Border." "Indian Jim." "A Tale of the Minnesota Massacre," "The Lost Trail: A Legend of the Far West," "The Hunter's Escape," "A Tale of the Northwest in 1864", just to name a few.

About this time, Deadwood Dick, created by Edward L. Wheeler, was among the most popular and lasting of dime novel characters. Deadwood Dick

Women's dime novels typically dealt with romance and marriage, drawing on the social experience of the readers. Stories often set up a love between a workingclass girl and a noble and sometimes told of marriages gone awry. Usually, these romantic ventures would end up in disaster, warning the working-class women that the emerging concept of an acceptable female sexuality was in fact. unacceptable.

"Dime novels aren't important to readers today as literature, but they are important as social history," said dime novel expert David Siegle. "They and their newspaper-format cousin, known as story papers, were printed on cheap paper and never meant to last. At the time, libraries sniffed at them as mass entertainment and didn't stock them. Some 60,000 titles were published, and they survived mainly thanks to private collectors who later gave or sold them to academic institutions, including the Library of Congress.'

"Some dime novel writers went on to great things,' Siegle said. "Edward Stratemeyer, who later gave the world the Nancy Drew and Hardy Boys books. started out writing dime novels. Bertha A. Clay, Geraldine Fleming and Laura Jean Libbey were the more prominent female writers of novels."

prominent in the business: Beadle and Adams, Munro, and Street and Smith.

Irwin and Erasmus Beadle and Robert Adams published the first dime novels under their publishing house. Beadle and Adams. in 1860. Between 1860 and 1865 alone. Beadle and Adams published more than five million Dime Novels. A falling out between the brothers of Beadle and Adams led Irwin to pull out of the partnership. He joined up with George Munro, a bookkeeper in the publishing house, and they founded their own publishing house, Munro. Munro began to publish its own version of Dime novels, calling them "Ten Cent Novels."

Street and Smith viewed fiction as a commodity, and editors had strict authority over the authors' works. Each author was allowed limited room for immense creativity and was required to follow specific guidelines in the plot lines and styles of writing they used.

"Several factors contributed to the explosion in Dime novel production during the last half of the 19th century," Siegle said. "First, technology allowed for mass production and consumption of the works. Mechanization of printing and development of new, cheaper types of paper allowed publishers to print more books in less time. Second, America was experiencing a significant in literacy rise rates Coming off a decade of social reform, the working class was more literate than ever before. A shift in the home from use of candles to oil lamps made it easier for readers to continue reading late into the night. Interest in the subject matter of the dime novels was high. With the battles with the Indians and the events of the Civil War, readers were looking for high action stories of the West.

Some of the most wellknown dime novel writers were Thomas C. Harbaugh, Albert W. Aiken, Edward L. Wheeler, Joseph W. Badger, Jr. and Colonel Prentiss Ingraham. Ingraham was the most successful writer of the short novels and creator of the famous character, Buffalo Bill. He completed more than 600 novels in his lifetime, in addition to a number of published plays and poems.

"Finding original copies of a dime novel is quite rare," says Siegle, who sells many vintage books from his collections at Trader's World at Monroe, Ohio, and each month at the Urbana Antique Show & Flea Market in Urbana, Ohio. "They're affordable. Dime novels nowadays, if you can find them, go for \$10 to \$40 a copy and up, owing chiefly to the fact that they were printed on poor quality paper that hasn't stood up well to the ravages of time. The printed paper of those days deteriorated a lot.

"The first edition of Beadle's "The life and times of Christopher Carson: the Rocky Mountain scout and guide" will fetch about \$2,500," Siegle said. "But it's not surprising that you can obtain one for between \$20 and \$50. Keep in mind, though, that the condition of these rare finds may be horrible."

In the early 1900s, pulp magazines, comic books and paperback originals were introduced to the public and the dime novel faded into the sunset just like so many of its stories.

Today, collectors search for paint by number kits and finished paintings. While nearly every artistic subject imaginable was drawn on paint by number panels at one time or another, the subjects or designs most sought after, and those that bring the highest prices, are paintings of real people (such as the Queen Elizabeth painting), real places (such as Stonehenge), and architectural items (such as buildings and bridges). Reproductions of real

paintings, such as Gainsborough's "The Blue Boy" are also still highly sought after along with Vincent Van Gogh's "Starry Night" and Salvador Dali's "Time." Several versions of Leonardo da Vinci's "The Last Supper" were produced. Some of these paint by number da Vinci's still hang in churches.

While reasonably new, the 60th-anniversary paint by number set released by Palmer Paint Products has proven irresistible to collectors. This kit, dedicated to the memory of the many people who lost their

lives on September 11th, depicts a ghostly image of the Twin Towers standing in spirit with the Manhattan skyline as a backdrop. This kit, in unpainted condition, was recently offered on eBay for \$45.

If you truly want to explore the paint by number phenomenon in depth, the online Paint by Number museum is located at www.paintbynumbermuseum.com. This museum, with over 6,000 paint by number paintings, has the world's largest online archive of paint by number works for you to view.
