The center of attention was an impeccable 1951 blue Ford panel truck. Described at 95 percent restored, a loving hand had taken care of every detail, from the rust-free exterior to the clean and rebuilt interior complete with a new wooden floor. It was a 3-speed on the column and the instrument panel looked amazing. When started up it "purred like a kitten" according to Elaine. This spacious, eye-catching vehicle was considered by many before driving the final bid up to \$13,000.

In keeping with the owner's interest in cars, there was a nice selection of 200 diecast trucks and semis in the 1/64 and 1/34However, the scales. model car that heated up the competition was the

vintage 18-inch Hiller Comet tether race car. This fascinating hobby consists of racing miniature vehicles that are equipped with a gas combustion engine. They are fastened or "tethered" to a post by a 33-foot steel cable and individually race around the track at amazing speeds. This brilliant red vehicle bearing the number 6 was claimed with a high bid of \$1,300. Other vintage toys included a Mobile Gas tanker that was claimed for \$110, a model International dozer for \$90, and a Smith Miller dump truck for \$100. The Lionel trains, many still in their original boxes, were also popular with the collectors, with the Halloween train selling for \$300 and various engines and cars from \$50-\$250.

## **Celluloid Uncle Sam marches on**

Author Julie Robinson called Celluloid "one of the nineteenth century's greatest inventions." In fact, it may be the greatest, especially when one considers the that the invention of celluloid directly led to the invention of plastics. Celluloid is considered the pre-historic relative of plastic's historic revolution. If you want to understand the importance of celluloid, try envisioning a world without plastic. American businessman John W. Hyatt invented celluloid in 1869, and it was the first entirely synthetic plastic-like material. Being man made there was an endless supply of

celluloid for manufacturer's use.

Hyatt invented celluloid as an inexpensive alternative to ivory for manufacturing billiard balls. Historically, all billiard balls had been made of elephant ivory, which caused the prices for these balls to remain quite high and the mortality rate of elephants to be even higher. Hyatt's discovery was a giant leap for mankind but proved a small step for him since celluloid, by its nature, is highly flammable and explosive. Hyatt's billiard balls tended to either explode or catch on fire on contact with another ball, causing quite a few distractions during play.

and by 1890, it had become a part of everyday life in American homes. By the turn of the century, celluloid was used to manufacture a cornucopia of different items for the home and workplace.

Celluloid literally revolutionized America just as the Industrial Revolution was kicking into high gear Manufacturers saw celluloid as an inexpensive synthetic substitute for a variety of natural materials, such as ivory, coral, horn, bone, motherof-pearl, amber, and tortoise shell.

The good news for collectors is that all celluloid toys were mass-produced, so there are still thousands and thousands of these toys on the secondary market.

While some collectors look for any type of celluloid toy, other collectors

the automotive collection theme also did well. Signs proved popular, including a metal sign with the slogan "Home of the DOC-TOR OF MOTORS, we install Perfect Circle Piston Rings". It featured a very confident-looking mechanic and left with a final bid of \$425. There was a Sealed Power Piston Rings rectangular white plastic lighted sign with red letters mounted on a chain that left for \$325. A brilliant yellow metal Pennzoil sign boasting the slogan "Sound your Z" and the words "100% pure Pennsylvania oil Pennzoil safe lubrication" superimposed over a red image of the Liberty Bell was claimed with a high bid of \$275. Another familiar sight at a filling station was a Coca Cola metal sign. Offering "ice cold Coca Cola" and "a sign of good taste" this recognizable red and white sign drew a final bid of \$425.

Several items that were found in service stations were offered, including some highly collectible clocks. Leading that category, Perfect Circle

piston rings lighted wall clock consisted of a white plastic body with red lettering around the perimeter. There was a small stain on the edge, but otherwise it was in very good condition and was claimed with a high bid of \$450. Not far behind, the American Hammer lighted clock was picked up with a bid of \$325.

Sorting through the many automotive collectibles, the Diamond Reo model engine stood out as a favorite. It was mounted on a wooden platform which had a triangular metal tag that read "Diamond Reo". This handsome model required a bid of \$400 to claim it. Another fun piece was the 1951 Ford red front bumper wall display, which despite some dirt and rust still commanded a final bid of \$200. Other related lots included several glass oil jars, some complete with their carrier, an ANCO windshield wiper metal cabinet, a box of miscellaneous hood ornaments, and even an engine lift.

Moving on to other popular areas of this estate, the owner certainly proved to be a music lover in addition to enjoying his gadgets. Two

items in particular highlight this interest. There was an Imperial single comb Symphonion with wind up lever and 30 discs. The handsome mahogany case featured a lithograph (with some damage) showing 7 young children playing music on the lid interior. The mahogany veneered stand provided space for disc storage. Elaine remarked that "soft tones of music could be heard" from this lovely instrument that was claimed with a high bid of \$900. An Edison Amberola model 5217 found a new home with a high bid of \$500, while several other Victor & Edison Amberolas went for \$250-\$500.

The collector was a man of many interests, including a passion for pocket watches and there were several to choose from. The most desirable proved to be a Waltham gold pocket watch which soared to a final value of \$600. Other watches sold for \$250-375. A 16-drawer antique wooden cabinet proved to be the perfect place to house several pocket watches, and this display along with several watches inside found a

A couple more items that don't fall into these categories were also well appreciated by the crowd. The merry sound of brass jingle bells will always encourage an enthusiastic response, and this set of 30 sleigh bells mounted on a leather strap, all in excellent condition, certainly proved the point. It required a high bid of \$500 to claim it. Then there was the brilliant red cast iron Gamewell telegraph fire alarm box from days gone by that proved to be popular. The paint was in excellent condition (likely restored), but the original key and alarm mechanism were missing. It required a bid of \$160 to claim it.

# Collectors get a bang out of vintage fireworks

Peonies, chrysanthemums, dahlias. Snaps, poppers, spinners. Snakes, strobes, fountains. Who hasn't looked up into an otherwise dark sky and been enchanted by fireworks? Colorful, loud, but with a hint of danger, firework displays are the much-anticipated climax of many community Fourth of July celebrations, a tradition that dates to Philadelphia in 1777. These days, fireworks have also found their way into New Year's Eve, baseball games, and the grand opening of furniture stores. And then there are those who prefer their fireworks intact, never ignited: For them, the thrill is owning rare (and sometimes unique) vintage examples. Just ask Bob Gerau. For decades, Gerau, a resident of Columbia, Mo., has been a major retailer of fireworks ("business is booming," he reported), the kind people shoot off in their backyards. Their vibrant colors first attracted him, he said. But sometime in the early 1960s, his business interest

there, he mentioned that he had stashed a few bricks aside for posterity. He was encouraged to bring them the following year because someone might be interested in them. It was the same story the following year, and the one after that. He really didn't have much hope for them, because they had amazement, he went home with an extra \$1,800 in his pocket. Thus, this fireworks fan

soon afterward became a serious collector. As he put it, "You don't have to hit me over the head with a two-byfour." Gerau began buying in earnest.

He's not alone. Although it's difficult to say how many people are active collectors of fireworks, he estimates they number in the hundreds, maybe more. Serious collectors are a tight knit group that buys, sells, and trades among themselves. He noted that collectors who live where fireworks are prohibited focus on wrappers. For other aficionados, witnessing extravagant displays is enough. And when they're gone, well, they're gone.

Gerau explained that exactly when, where, and by whom fireworks were invented remains a mystery. But the "consensus of opinion" is that the formula for black powder was developed in China many hundreds of years ago. The formula was a

well-kept secret because it gave Chinese warriors "superiority over their enemies. People had never seen anything like it," Gerau said. And, he added, "It scared their horses." Over the years, saltpeter, charcoal, and sulphur were supplemented with aluminum or titanium, which resulted in more flash. Metal salts produce the colors. But the details of all of this, he said, "are lost to history."

For years, he continued, fireworks are said to have been a cottage industry in China, one that involved the entire family: Dad made the

firecrackers, Mom braided them together, and the kids used a dab of glue to affix the labels. There was little uniformity in the process, resulting in a seemingly unlimited number of variations in packaging. As a result, "labels continue to show up that we've never seen before," Gerau said.

Although there are pricing guidelines for fireworks, valuations are subjective, and determined collectors are often willing to pay whatever it takes to separate a rare example from its owner. In his own voluminous collection. Gerau said he has three packs that are worth over \$3,000 a piece, one of which is the only one known to exist, and the other, one of five. Rarity is important in determining value, and the better the condition, the higher the price.

Collectors classify firecrackers into seven Class categories: 1 firecrackers were made in China or Hong Kong before 1950; Class 2, made in Portuguese Macau (1950-1954;) Class 3, made in Macau and marked "ICC" (1955-1968); Class 4, made in Macau, marked "ICC," and including "cautions" (1969-1972); Class 5, made in Macau or China with "DOT" and "cautions" (1973-1976); Class 6, made in China and marked with "DOT," "50 mg" and "cautions" (1977-1994); and

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Class 7, made in China with UN0336 1.4G" and "warnings" (1995-present).

Serious collectors are primarily interested in those from Classes 1 and 2, for which they pay serious money. Gerau points to a 2012 two-day auction at Morphy Auctions that netted nearly a half-million dollars in sales of vintage fireworks; even the catalog essential remains to collectors

But there is room in this collecting category for beginners with a limited budget. Examples dating from the 1970s might sell for \$5 to \$10, although prices can easily slip into the hundred-dollar range. Although there is no right or wrong way to begin, a new collector might select a specific kind of graphic and focus on labels that are personally pleasing. Reproductions can be a problem for the untrained eye; one way to learn more is to join a collector's club, of which there are a number.

The uninitiated would do well not to ask Gerau "Aren't fireworks dangerous?" His standard answer is, "no more than a book of matches." Neither, he pointed out, will spontaneously combust. "They're not going to explode. They can lie there for eternity."

On the other hand, when asked why he collects fireworks, Gerau turns contemplative. "I have thought about that for years," he said. He explains that when he was growing up, a child could go to a corner store with 13 cents in his pocket and purchase two nickel packs and three penny packs. That is, if that child was fortunate enough to have 13 cents. "I didn't have a lot of money, and I was limited as to what I could buy." Things have changed for him. "Now, I have millions of fireworks," he concluded. "I've got them, and I'm not going to shoot them."

Founded in 1901 by Bernard Doyle, Alexander Paton, and Paul Rie, Viscoloid began by using celluloid to manufacture ornamental hair combs. By 1914, as Europe entered World War I, Viscoloid began making celluloid dolls and toys. And by 1920, Viscoloid was America's leading manufacturer of celluloid toys, employing over 350 workers in its Wilmington, Del., plant.

In 1925, Viscoloid merged with The DuPont Company, becoming The DuPont Viscoloid Compa-
