10 empty Corgi boxes drew collectors at Freeland Auction Service

FREELAND, Mich. — Toy lovers know that sometimes the box can be as valuable as the toy itself or perhaps even more valuable.

That was the case when Freeland Auction Services sold the toy collection of Dr. Wallace Pike from Swartz Creek, Mich. He had collected dozens of Corgi, Matchbox, Lesney, Dinky, Solido, Tekno and other vintage die cast toy. There were 200 lots sold during the three-hour online auction.

The highest bid went to 10 empty Corgi toy boxes. These were the original Corgi boxes and were in excellent condition. No cars were included. A James Bond Aston Martin box from the "Goldfinger" movie was included in this grouping. There was also a James Bond Toyota box from the film "You Only Live Once." An ice cream van, a Chevrolet fire chief's car, a Heinkel-X economy car, and a Land Rover helped to add to the excitement over this lot of boxes. The final bid price was an impressive \$160 for a lot of boxes with no cars.

Being sold with the original packaging was a 1948 Ford Coupe die cast toy. It was number ten in the Auto Buff series. These boxes weren't very interesting. They were plain brown with a flowery-looking border in brown and simply said, Above: A 1049 Buick Roadmaster still had all "Brooklin Models." But the surprise inside was the beauty of the exact replica of the car. This one was in excellent condition and the plainer brown box with the car was sold for \$50.

Made in red, white, and blue was a Corgi car transporter.

Surf the sidewalks on a vintage skateboard

The history of skateboarding is almost as interesting as collecting the vintage boards. Most historians agree skateboarding began in California in the late 1940s or early '50s. While no one truly knows who made the first skateboard, Bill Richards, a Los Angeles surf shop owner, commissioned the Chicago Roller Skate Company to produce the first manufactured skateboards using skate wheels, which were attached to rectangular wooden boards. When Richards first began marketing his new sport board, he called the sport

"Sidewalk Surfing" because early skateboarders copied the styles and maneuvers of surfers, and they skateboarded barefoot, which was

referred to as "losing nine." Accordingly, the first skateboards were either wood boards or wooden boxes with a T-handle with roller skate

wheels attached to the bottom of the board. The T-handle was actually attached to the nose, sometimes called crate scooters, giving the board a rudimentary handle to grasp, more like a child's scooter than a skateboard. But skateboarders quickly got rid of the T-bar, and skate-

boards made of planks and wheels emerged.

Primitive skateboards continued through the 1950s, but by the 1960s, some surfboard manufacturers (such as Hobie, Kips', and

Golf show hit a hole in one for visitors and exhibitors

DUBLIN, Ohio - Nearly 100 golf memorabilia enthusiasts gathered in Dublin Jan. 7-8, for the Columbus Golf Collectibles Show, hosted by Gary and Susan Wyckhoff of Huntsville. Both members of the Golf Heritage Society, they have hosted the show since 2015.

This year's show, at the Hilton Embassy Suites Hotel in Dublin, attracted more than 50 exhibitors.

Among the exhibitors was Dr. Michael Hurdzan, a golf course architect of some renown – his Erin Hills Golf Course near Milwaukee, Wis., was the site for the U.S. Open in 2017 - who had a table with a variety of books. Hurdzan's office on Old Henderson Road in Columbus, is a treasure of golf artifacts itself, from books to posters, golf clubs and more from which he annually

brings in a sampling for sale. 'It is an enjoyable show," he said, "and I love seeing again friends and fellow collectors."

Some of these hail from as far as Texas and the Carolinas, some from New York, Michigan and Pennsylvania. Some, like Bob Muir of Pittsburgh, confess that he does not expect to sell much. For him, the real value of the show are the connections he makes, the opportunity to see what others bring and, like Hurdzan, the chance to catch up with old friends.

Hickory golf clubs seemed by far the items in most abundance, still the visitor could select from small silver collectibles such as cigarette cases, hat pins, brooches and the like, to gorgeous ceramics from the likes of Spode, Gerz, Royal Doulton, and O'Hara, and even lovely examples of classic clubs from the 1960s-1980s.

There were posters fea-

turing modern heroes like Tiger Woods, Jack and Arnie to the legendary stars of the distant past such as Bobby Jones, Walter Hagen and Harry Vardon. One display of colorful golf ball boxes caught the eye, as did a handsome set of golf statuettes made by Endurance LTD, a now defunct maker of sports figurines from Dunfermline in Scotland.

Some items could be had for a mere handful of dollars while others, such as rare clubs, golf balls and books, might have the potential buyer and seller locked in serious negotiations for a few

One fellow left the room several times with bundles of hickory golf clubs that he presumably will repair and re-sell. Another found an early club made by a manufacturer that he collects.

"It's a hickory-shafted mashie made by the Vulcan Company of Portsmouth, Ohio," Paul O'Neill said. "I'm from Portsmouth and I collect these. I was very happy to find it."

Modern putter designer Bobby Grace was seen in the room, offering some of his own clubs, some of which fetch handsome prices in four figures, but also gathering information for a project that charts the evolution of the wedge, or sand wedge. "One of the collectors in here has some prime examples," Grace said, "and I'm lucky he is willing to share photos and information about them."

Wyckhoff said he plans to host the show again next year, same place and around the same time in early January. Meanwhile, for those keen to get into the robust hobby of golf collecting, check out the Golf Heritage Society at www.golfheritage.

This was a big Bedford tractor unit and was in good condition. This older Corgi die cast was a hard to find toy, and its colors made it stand out. The cab was red, and the double-decker trailer on the back showed off one white one and one blue. The selling price on this patriotic die cast toy was \$40.

Small but mighty were the pocket packs. They were ready to spring to action and soar down the straight track at top speeds. These three very unusual pocket packs were paired with a vintage Tekno Denmark car and sold as a lot of four. Two of the pocket pack cars still retained the original clear plastic top that protected them. The wide tires and motors exposed were a real draw to collectors. This group of four die cast brought a final bid price of \$35.

Any Star Trek fan would have loved to get their hands on the 1976 U.S.S. Enterprise Dinky toy sold at this auction. Made in England for Paramount television, this vintage die cast was in great condition. It was an exact duplicate of the famous Enterprise. The shuttle was hanging on below the spaceship which had the name proudly marked on the perimeter. This toy brought a final bid price of \$25, probably to be set upon a shelf and displayed.

A Bat boat? Yes -Batman had a boat. Made by Glastron, the Bat boat was in the basic black and red color scheme. This one was a bit unusual in that it still had its windshield. This was the one piece that was almost always lost on this toy. This boat was meant to be mobile, fast, and deadly. The Bat boat had glowing bat eyes, the red flashing Bat beacon, a glowing Bat signal in the tail fin, and of course, hatches for the Batzooka. This unique and famous Corgi toy brought a high bid price

Quite unique was a Benz 240D automobile 3308.

with a camping trailer. This piece opened up a whole world of imaginary camping trips, pulling a home behind. So, no more roughing it and sleeping on the ground and cooking over an open fire. One could now go inside the camper and feel like they were home, while enjoying a complete getaway. The final bid price of \$18 made this piece a real


Corgi made airplanes too. A Concorde plane made in Great Britain was in good condition. Made in the die cast material, this white flying beauty went for a bid price of \$24. You could see all the passenger windows along both sides and with some imagination, this toy could take you soaring to any place you wanted to be. It was marked "British Airways" on the side, just below the long row of windows



Collectors are falling for snow globes

By Doug Graves

The snow globe (sometimes called a snow dome, water globe or snowstorm) is an object that simultaneously evokes holiday cheer and, for some, an eye-roll-worthy sensation. Snow gloves are irresistible for their promise of brief, easy entertainment. In addition, there's an added visual delight of miniatures in each globe. To many the globes were a reminder of a place once visited.

Hard to believe, these often-bought and soon thereafter discarded, hand-held holiday items are now worth a pretty penny or two. These

Early globe makers made the inside figures of porcelain, bone, metals, minerals, rubber or wax. their promotional snow globe are replicas The snow, or flitter' as it was called, could have been ground rice, wax, soap, sand, bone fragments, meerschaum, metal flakes or sawdust. The bases that held the globes have been of stone, marble,

> "Snow globes are widely collectible," says Dr. Lori Verderame, well known antique appraiser. "While they were once reserved as a seasonal, winter collectible, the snow globe has become a popular keepsake year round."

The oldest known description of a snow globe-like object comes from an 1880 U.S. Commissioners report on the 1878 Paris Universal Exposition, where a local glassware company showcased a group of "paper weights of hollow balls" filled with water, containing a man with an umbrella. Also at the Expo were snow globes that contained a small scale model of the newly unveiled Eiffel Tower inside.

The objects also contained white powder that fell in imitation of a snow storm when turned upside down. Such glass-domed paperweights were popular in the late 1800s, but this appears to be the first to include such a playful feature. However, it an Austrian man named Erwin Perzy who is widely considered to be its

> just 24 years old at the time and he was specializing in designing and repairing medical tools. When local doctors asked him for better light in their operating room, he got to work. Though doctors had electric light bulbs at the time, the newly introduced light bulbs didn't produce much light. Perzy needed a way to

make the light brighter. He had noticed shoemakers were using water-filled balls or water globes to magnify the light of a candle. Perzy tried this too, but the light was still not bright enough.

> He tried flakes of metal, but they sank too quickly. One day he found a white powder (semolina, used for baby food) and poured it into the glass globe. It got soaked by the water and floated very slowly to the base of the glove. This effect reminded him of a snowfall, giving him the basic idea for inventing a snow globe.

One day, for fun, he put a pewter model of a tiny church into the water-filled ball, then added the white semolina flakes. The result was the look of snowfall that delighted those who saw it. A friend of his took the invention to his store, where it was sold immediately. And the snow globe was born.

Perzy added a miniature diorama in his globe, which for the first 40 years of production was always a church. After World War II he incorporated different designs, such as Christmas trees and snowmen. His company is now run by his great-grandson (Erwin Perzy III) and offers 350 different designs. Today, the company produces more than 300,000 snow globes each year.

Perzy's invention gained momentum and eventually globes found their way into the United States. By 1925 a Pittsburgh man named Joseph Garajha obtained a patent to improve upon the snow globe. His feature was that of a new style of glass base that allowed water-filled snow globes to screw, like a light bulb, into a socket base.

artificial snow "The at the time was made of bone or porcelain chips or non-soluble soap flakes," Verderame said. "Today, fake snow is made of tiny pieces of plastic. The snow globe blizzard is enhanced using distilled water or glycerin which makes the flakes hover within the enclosed globe. Some collectible snow globes have Swiss music box mechanisms included in them as well."

Snow globes gained popularity in the U.S. as a promotional item for thousands of travel destinations and roadside attractions. Snow globes were integrally linked with

early roadside travel, as early tourist amusement parks. motels and restaurants needed to stand out from the crowd. Snow globes were publicity for famous landmarks, museums, caverns and caves, missions or old homes of famous people, train rides, miniature golf, gardens, trained bear acts, animal parks and storybook castles.

In America during the 1940s, snow globes were often used for The 1940 advertising. Oscar-nominated drama Kitty Foyle, which used one as a plot device

Snow globes have appeared in several film scenes, the most famous of which is the opening of the 1941 classic Citizen Kane, wherein Kane dies while holding a glass sphere containing a wintery miniature log cabin, which falls and shatters on the ground.

By the late 1950s, snow globes had become an American phenomenon. Innovations in plastic production and injectionmolding during the 1950s further improved the snow globe. Pricey particles used for the "snow" were replaced with cheap plastic flitter, while glycol mixed with water helped it fall more slowly.

American domes were designed and manufactured by one of three companies: Western The Karol Corporation, Nanco, and the Allen-Lewis Manufacturing Company. These companies were also making salt and pepper shakers, glasses. pennants, ashtrays, tablecloths and scarves at the same time.


"Most collectors of snow globes do so by category such as age, by maker, by character and so on," Verderame said. valuable snow globes feature tourist landmarks or famous cities and many collectors key in on this category of globe. Vintage snow globes of good quality materials hold their value. Look for a strong base

tableau that is complex or intricate as these types of snow globes will bring greater value with collectors. Avoid snow globes that are cloudy or show signs of significant excessive wear or damage on the interior as that will negatively impact the snow globe's value."

According Verderame, snow globes don't mind a little dust, but direct sunlight is a definite no-no.

"Snow domes are not only fascinating to look at, to hold, to play with, they are folk art," says collector Nancy McMichael, author of Snowdomes (Abbeville Press). "They are a bridge back to an idealized past we think existed but is actually in our head. It is something we carry with

Makaha) began manufacskateboards. turing These skateboards resembled surfboards, making them easy to promote and sell to the surfing communities in Southern California.

1963, In Larry Stevenson, owner of Makaha, sponsored, perhaps, the earliest skateboard competition. This was held at Pier Avenue Junior High School in Hermosa Beach, California. And in 1964, Surf's Up, a popular '60s television show, featured skateboarders on the

show, helping to promote the new and exciting sidewalk sport.

Finally, in 1964, John Severson published the first skateboarding magazine, The Quarterly Skateboarder. Severson wrote in his first editorial, "The history of skateboarding is being made now. You are the pioneers." Sadly, the magazine closed after four issues, possibly because of a warning Severson had issued, "Already, there are storm clouds on the horizon with opponents of the sport talking about bans and restrictions." Severson resumed publication in 1975, calling his new magazine

Skateboarder.

The first television broadcast of a skateboarding competition was in 1965—the National Skateboarding Championships held in Anaheim, California.

Skateboarding hung around as a sport, but it did not take off because the wheels of skateboards were either metal, like old roller skates, or made of clay, which chipped, cracked, and exploded. Then, in the early 1970s Frank Nasworthy developed a skateboard wheel made of polyurethane. Nasworthy called his company Cadillac Wheels since his boards had the Cadillac of all wheels on

them. Cadillac Wheels improved performance, traction, and thrills, so riders, both surfers and non-surfers, flocked to the new skateboards. And modern skateboarding was here to stay with most of the skateboards for the next 30 years or so being made of maple plywood.

Since that time, new magazines have been released, skateboard parks have developed. and manufacturers have built skateboards from exotic composite materials, such as aluminum and fiberglass. Around the year 2000, collectors started to look seriously at the older, first edition

skateboards. While speed and gadgetry attract young skateboarders, old, vintage skateboards are now being hung in homes, offices, and businesses as skateboarders look back on nearly 70 years of skateboarding history.

John Severson was right about one thing, "The history of skateboarding is being made now," and the skateboards of today will be the collector items of tomorrow! Carson Guo proved this correct when, in January 2019, the 17-year-old skateboarder from Vancouver, paid \$800,000 at a Sotheby's Auction in New York City for the 248-piece skate-

board collection owned, at the time, by Ryan Fuller, proving, forever, skateboard collecting, like the board itself, has gone completely gnarly!

12-drawer library cabinet filed away a \$210 bid at Midland Bid Junkies

MIDLAND, Mich. -Good marketing starts with a catchy name - and in today's world, the internet address to match. Lynnae Osborne's Midland Bid Junkies (midlandbidjunkies.com) plainly has both.

Osborne has been an avid part of the auction industry for over a decade. Michigan buyers and sellers know her from her auction house. The industry recognizes her professional chops as a graduate of the Reppert School Auctioneering and through her service on the Board of Directors of the Michigan Auctioneers Association.

Midland Bid Junkies conducts onsite auctions and online sales via a private-labeled version of HiBid. They hold everything from regular monthly auctions to moving/downsizing sales, estate sales, liquidations, and cleanouts. They held their final 2021 monthly auction at their Midland Mall location at the old Younker's store. It was an online-only auction aimed at local buyers, as no shipping was available. While it was a year-end wrap-up, it was not a small affair. Over 800 lots of furniture, home decor, media,

and even clothing, were on the block.

Plenty of furniture was available. One of the pieces - a 12-drawer library cabinet - picked up the auction's highest bid of \$210. Lovers of mid-century-style furnishings had a good handful to chase. Ten pieces of modestly-priced modernist and retro-style furniture were available. Among them was a 36-inch Danish modern shelving unit, in good condition that sold for \$76. To pair with it was a 55-inch Danish modern credenza that sold for \$54. Selling for an amazing \$6 was a blonde Heywood-Wakefield style drop leaf dining table, which opened to over six feet.

Home decor spanned the usual array, ranging from lamps and accent pieces to wall art and glassware. A 64 by 77 inch Pendleton wool blanket in like-new condition sold for \$78. A pair of 21-inch metal wall axes hit \$36. A beautiful cobalt blue 11 ½-inch Blenko decanter with topper, in good condition, also reached \$36.

Appealing to local riders were 40 lots with Harley-Davidson merchandise. Among the merchandise were three leather Harley jackets. One, a zipper-front,

XL, in almost-new condition was snagged for \$45. The other two - one a zipper-front large, the other a medium - both in good condition, went for \$38 and \$28 respectively. Other Harley-Davidson items included: a large Midway gloss-black helmet with zippered neck cover and storage bag sold for \$29; a pair of lady's auburn harness stud boots in like-new condition was grabbed for \$16; and, a large gray zippered raincoat with storage bag went for \$15.

Cutlery and knives were a prominent category, with nearly three-dozen lots offered. Most of the pieces were new - like the pair of Copperhead Creek pocket knives that sold for \$12, as well as five lots with Whitetail Cutlery knives that averaged \$6 each. A vintage lot, pairing a primitive knife and chopper, made it to \$12.

Media came in the form of collectible magazines, vintage vinyl, and cassettes, as well as CDs and DVDs. Picking up the highest sum in the category, at \$150, was a collection of 201960s/1970s Michigan State sports programs. There were two lots of Playboy magazines. One containing 26 editions from

the 1990s sold for \$26, while a lot with 21 editions from the early 2000s went for \$23. Two lots of vintage records came up. A box approximately two-dozen mixed albums sold for \$9. A bidder snagged another lot of sixteen mainly 70s-era albums for just \$4.

Just in time for the holiday gifting were more than 75 lots featuring vintage and new toys. Twenty-one of the lots were popular Funko Pop toys, new in the box. The highest bid of \$17 went for a Red Hood Super Heroes, #236. Winning bids dropped to as low as \$3 for a #18 Conan O'Brien Figure.

On the holiday decoration front, an eight-piece lot of Hallmark ornaments, that included a decorated tree, lighthouse, Barbie Corvette, along with Disney and Bugs Bunny figures made it to \$37. A new-inbox 1997 Little People Santa's sleigh was won for \$17. For anyone setting up that wintertime scene under the tree, six lots of Garfield's Christmas Village buildings landed an average of \$11 each.


