ACROSS THE AUCTION BLOCK

Bud Stewart duck lure caught a \$1,025 bid at John Peck auction

GLADWIN, Mich. — On March 10, John Peck Auctions conducted an exciting decoy and sportsman-themed living estate auction featuring 832 lots from an exceptional one-owner collection. The sale included angling collectibles, carved fish decoys, guns, ammunition, and wildlife art, along with numerous other sporting collectibles.

Firearms and related goods anchored much of the sale, with approximately 40 long guns auc-

tioned. The selection included modern, antique, and reproduction rifles and shotguns, as well as several black powder firearms. Possession was handled through two fed-

erally licensed firearm facilities, allowing buyers to participate with ease.

Among the standouts, pulling \$2,100, was a like-new Henry H011 lever-action .44-40 rifle,

featuring a brass receiver, deluxe wood stock, and 24-inch octagon barrel. Bidding hit \$1,525 for

a Benelli Super Black Eagle 3 semi-auto 12-gauge shotgun with digital camo finish and 28-inch ventilated rib barrel. Competition was also strong on a good-condition Japan-made Browning BL lever-action

.22 LR, fitted with a white maple stock and engraved silver receiver. In good condition with only light handling marks, it brought \$720.

Handguns were a smaller segment, with

Collectors hop to collecting Easter rabbit postcards

Postcards and Easter are a natural fit.

The earliest postcards had no images or photos on them. One side was for the recipient's address, and the other side, the front of the card was for the message. Postcards with images attached first

appeared in France in 1870. By 1880, the use of postcards had spread to the United States.

In 1906, split-side postcards emerged in America. These cards were designed with an image or photo on the front side and a split back side for the address and message. The Golden Age of Postcards existed from 1907 to 1915, and more than a billion postcards were mailed annually during this time period, which peaked in 1910.

Today, collectors are attracted to vintage postcards for a variety of reasons, including the post-

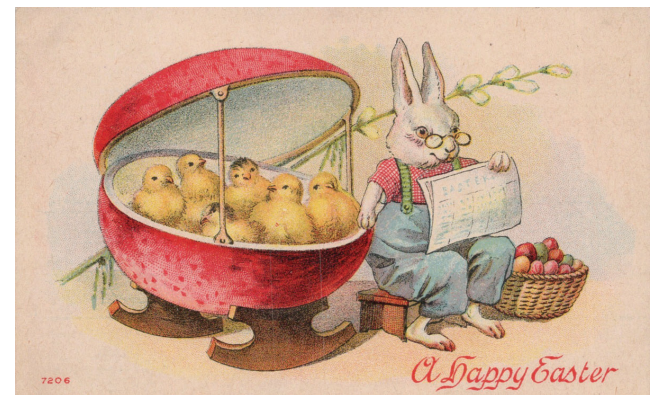

cards themselves, the image, the stamp used, and the message as a historical social item. Collectors often narrow their collections based on interests. Collectors interested in Easter postcards might limit their collection to Easter Bunny postcards.

The Easter Bunny

came to us through German folklore, especially the German spring goddess Eostre and her fertility symbols (rabbits, hares, and eggs). German immigrants to America merged the celebration of Eostre with Christian Easter traditions. The most prominent German story to merge with Easter

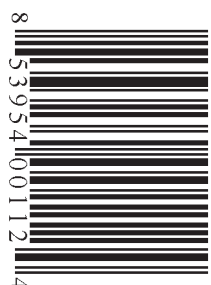
is the story of Osterhase (Easter Hare) who delivered colored eggs to children. This story evolved into our modern Easter

egg hunt.

Early Easter bunnies or

just eight crossing the block. Leading the group was a Ruger Mark IV Hunter semi-auto .22 LR in like-new condition. It featured a Burris FastFire III red dot, stainless finish, fluted barrel, rosewood finger-groove grips. It came with two magazines and a range bag. The package closed at \$710. Markedly different was an Italian-made Pedersoli .45 caliber flintlock reproduction pistol, clean overall but needing work, which sold for \$140.

Shooters eagerly bid on more than 150 ammunition lots in a broad range of types and calibers. The

high mark of \$150 went to a lot with 200 rounds of .300 Blackout 155-grain ammo, six rounds of .223 Remington, and an ammo can. Later, a box of 20 Winchester "Legendary Lawmen" 150 grain .30-30 cartridges closed at \$100. Meanwhile, 150 rounds of Nosler Partition .30 caliber (.308), in a mix of 150, 165, and 180 grain loads, finished at \$81.

Black powder enthusi-

asts had tempting items to consider. Among them was a 6-inch can of DuPont Superfine gunpowder that left for \$43, while a bid of just \$16 got an 8-ounce can of DuPont smokeless antique shot-gun powder.

For shooters uninterested in firearms, there was a Ravin R20 Helicoil crossbow package that soared to \$1,275. It was armed with arrows, a quiver, broadheads, and a Vortex Strike Eagle scope. Practice gear was also available, like a Black Hole crossbow target, which scored a modest \$34.

Given the sale's sporting focus, decoys were naturally on display. Over 60 were available, many of them folk-art varieties. They included a 6.5-inch Bud Stewart turtle spearing decoy, which pulled \$580. A \$330 offer won a larger 10-inch Stewart bass spearing decoy. Others included a 9-inch signed swimming duck spearing decoy for \$270, a circa 1992 6.5-inch Jim Nelson carved frog decoy for \$76, and a 7-inch Carl Christensen rainbow trout spearing decoy for \$53.

Duck decoys attracted their own attention, led by a 12-inch Tom Taber example, which climbed to \$190. A slightly larger 13-inch Taber decoy finished close at \$180. Field decoys also saw action,

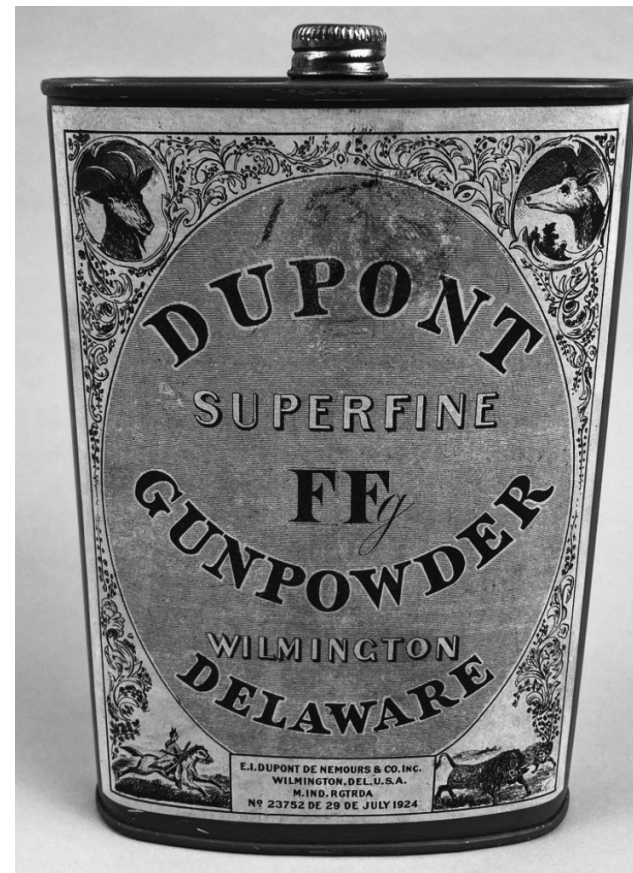
like a set of six plastic goose and two turkey decoys, finding a buyer at \$90.

Anglers also kept busy with a substantial variety of fishing gear. Roughly a dozen rods were auctioned, covering freshwater, fly, and ice fishing styles. Prices remained modest, topping out at \$71 for a 27-inch Light-13 tickle stick with a Free Fall reel. A pairing of vintage three-piece South Bend and Monague fly rods landed \$41.

Reels followed a similar pattern, with both vintage and modern casting, fly, and spinning varieties, from makers like Johnson, Shakespeare, and Zebco, selling from \$2-\$25.

Fishing lures dominated the angling category, with about 150 lots available. A standout was a 1.5-inch Bud Stewart duck lure, which soared to \$1,025. Other Stewart pieces also did well, like a 2-inch duck lure that grabbed \$610, and a 6-inch custom-order frog lure that nabbed \$540. Some of the more unusual versions included a 3.5-inch Bud Stewart duck lure at \$350, a 7-inch muskrat lure for \$160, and a 6-inch crippled eel lure at \$130.

Anglers also pursued practical gear. A 13.5-inch-long fishing creel basket, possibly Native American-made, reached \$350, while a smaller leather-and-clasp creel sold for \$27. Trout nets found favor, like a

Vintage Ames MFG Co. "Troutster" net going for \$45, and an Ed Cumings (Flint, Mich.) trout net close behind at \$43.

The angling theme extended into the first of the sporting and wildlife artwork. A dozen folk-art fish wall mounts included a 48-inch wood fish decoy signed by Jim Nelson, which reached \$250, and a 30-inch steelhead at \$230. Over two dozen pieces of wall art spanned everything from wildlife portraits to ammunition displays. Highlights included a Nosler bullet display for \$370, a

National Wild Turkey Federation stamp collection at \$220, and an original fly-fishing watercolor by Jerry Horan for \$74.

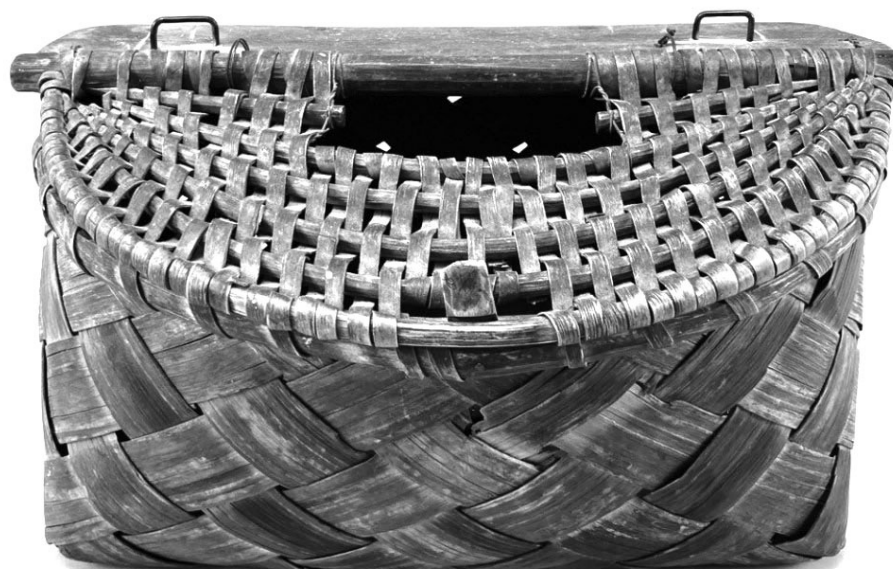
Sculptural art included a 1997 numbered bronze, "The Sheep Hunter," which achieved \$350, a Remington "Bronco Buster" Bronze on a marble base, for \$170, and a 13-inch 1995 Whitetails Unlimited bronze, "Walking the Line," at \$110.

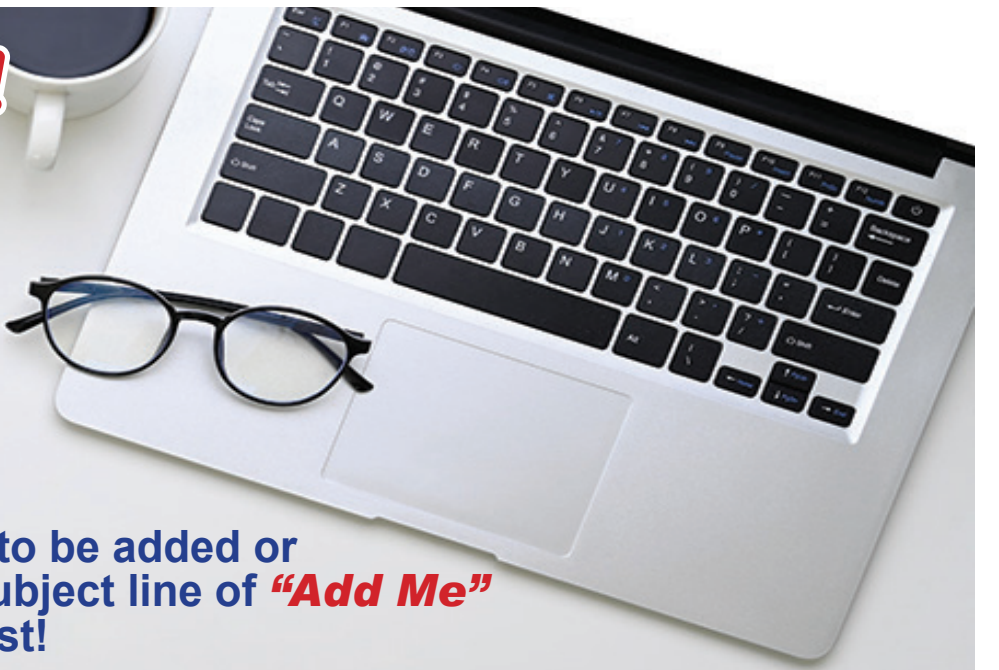

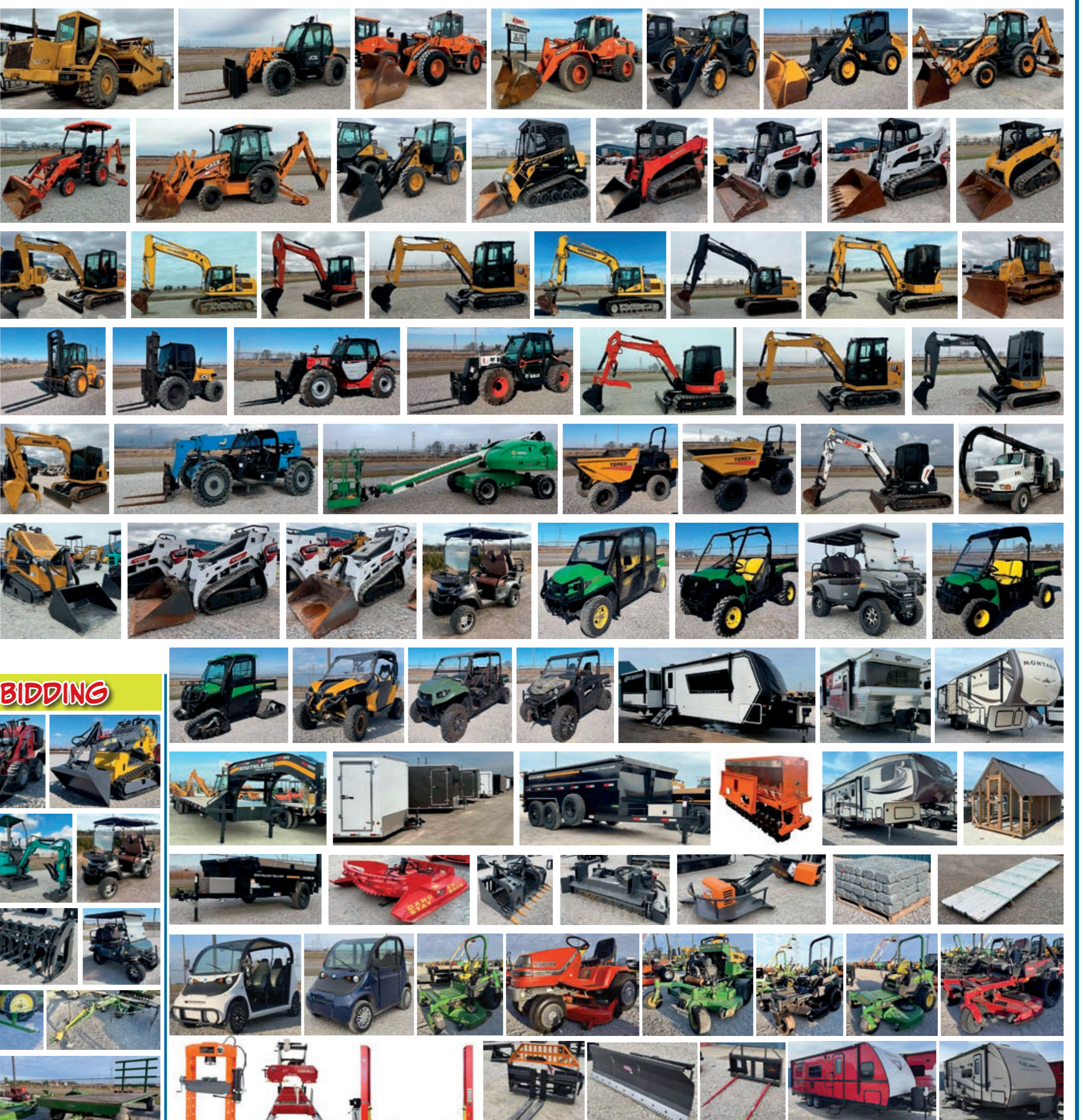

hares were often depicted as anthropomorphic animals wearing clothing and acting in human ways, such as carrying a basket of colored eggs to children.

In the German Lutheran religion, the earliest Easter Hare originally played a role as judge, evaluating whether children were good or disobedient in behavior, suggesting a similarity to Santa Clause declaring a child "naughty or nice." In these Germanic stories, the Easter Hare carried a basket of colored eggs, candy, and toys to the homes of children. Good

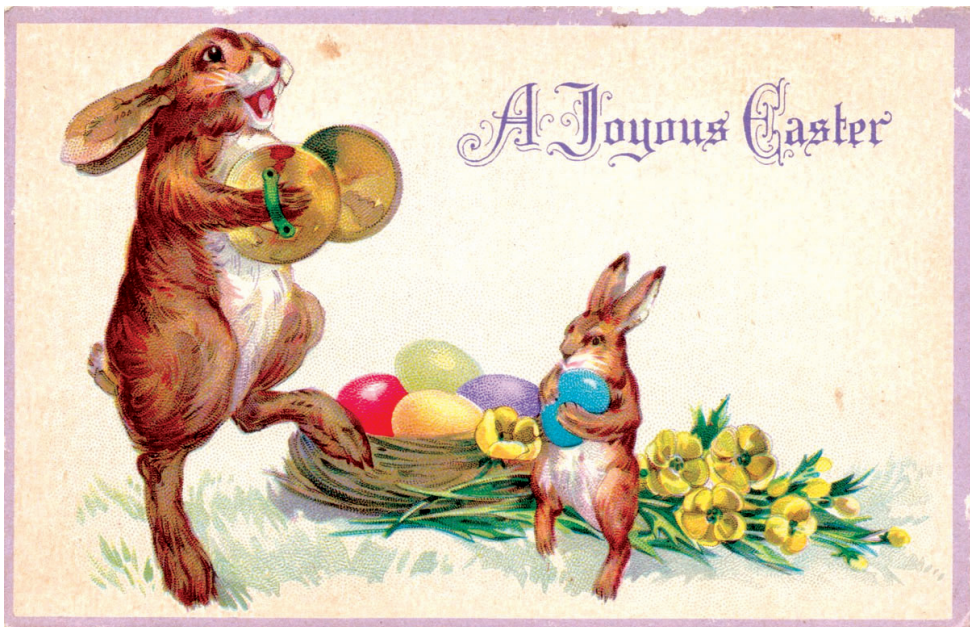

Coasters still hold a place for collectors

The next time you set down your drink, peek at the coaster beneath it. What seems like a simple tabletop protector is actually a tiny piece of design history and possibly the start of an enjoyable collecting hobby. From vintage brewery pieces to 1970s table sets, coasters capture changing styles in advertising, design, and leisure - one drink at a time.

One keepsake coaster can lead to another, and before long, you're in a hobby with a name: tegetology. It draws both casual collectors and devoted enthusiasts. Consider Austria's Leo Pisker, the Guinness World Record holder with a collection of over 150,000 coasters from 160 countries.

Interest in coaster collecting has grown thanks to the boom in craft beer and small-batch spirits. Today, hardly a brewery or distillery hasn't commissioned its own coasters for the bar top - continuing a long tradition of using them as miniature advertising canvases.

Before coasters graced

barrooms, they played a more elegant role at the dinner table. In the late 18th century, coasters were trays made of materials like silver or wood, used to hold wine bottles or decanters. After the servants retired for the evening, the tray could be slid - or "coasted" - across the table from one guest to another.

The familiar drink coaster developed later, for completely different reasons. In beer halls across Europe, early versions of the drink coaster, often made of fabric, were placed on top of a mug or glass to keep insects out of the drink. Eventually, coasters moved beneath the glass, catching spills and absorbing condensation, setting the stage for the

variety we know today.

Germany played a key role in shaping modern coasters. In 1880, printer Friedrich Horn produced one of the first cardboard drink mats, printed with illustrations and phrases. Twelve years later, another German, Robert Sputh of Dresden, patented a version made from compressed wood pulp, which proved both highly absorbent and durable.

In the 1920s, England's Watney Combe & Reid introduced the first branded mats to promote its beer line, starting a trend of breweries using coasters as advertising pieces. By the early 20th century, they were common throughout Europe. In Britain, they became known as "beermats," a

name that has endured.

American breweries were quick to see the potential of coasters as a simple, inexpensive way to catch customers' eyes. Michigan's Kalamazoo Brewing Company and Hubach's Brewery in Tiffin, Ohio, were among the first in the early 20th century to experiment with featuring their logos on coasters.

The practice really took off after the repeal of Prohibition. Many credit Pabst for leading the charge by commissioning coasters to promote its flagship Blue Ribbon beer. As more breweries reopened and competition grew, branded coasters became a common sight in taverns, restaurants, and hotel bars, turning the humble coaster into a miniature billboard placed right under the customer's glass.

Several printing firms specialized in coasters during the early through mid-20th century. Among the best known were Absorbo Beer Pad Co., Inc., of New York, and Curt Teich & Company of Chicago, both active from the 1930s through the 1950s. The Katz Group began making absorbent beer mats in 1903, growing into one of the largest coaster producers in the world. By the 1950s, printed coasters were commonplace. Though meant to be discarded, they started catching the eyes of patrons, who unwittingly

preserved examples that became today's collectibles.

Where bar coasters shouted with branding, home designs promoted elegance and practical use. Decorative coasters trace their roots to the saucer, a staple of Western tea culture, where small dishes protected tables from drips. As tea, coffee, and cocktails became more popular, delicate furniture inspired specialized pads made of cork, fabric, or leather to shield fine wood from scratches and condensation. Over time, elaborate versions made of materials like brass, marble, and wood became fashionable, becoming subtle accents on dining tables and sideboards. Unlike their disposable, bar-top cousins, home coasters were crafted for elegance and durability.

Collectors treasure these coasters as tiny windows into domestic life from bygone eras, starting with the Victorian period, when they were almost miniature works of art. Silversmiths like Elkington & Co. crafted finely engraved silver and silver-plated pieces, Minton's and Royal Doulton pro-

duced richly glazed stoneware and earthenware, and woodworking firms such as Tunbridge Ware created intricate mosaics of colored wood.

In the early 20th century, coaster designs mirrored rapidly changing tastes. The 1910s brought flowing Art Nouveau examples, while the 1920s and '30s embraced the sleek geometry of Art Deco by companies like Revere Copper and Brass and its bold chrome and copper coasters, or Fostoria Glass Company with their heavy, clear glass "American" pattern, which became a fixture on tables nationwide.

Decorative coasters really took off after World War II, when consumerism and modern home design made them a décor and gift-giving staple. Materials borrowed from the war effort, like aluminum, Lucite, and Melamine, were fashioned into jet-age designs that complemented contemporary furnishings. Companies like Crest Specialty made popular "Dripcut" coasters for the cocktail crowd; even Hasbro dabbled in playful plastic coasters through its housewares division.

The 1960s and '70s embraced natural materials such as cork, wood, and wool, reflecting a growing taste for earthy design. But even Epoxy resin became popular, often encasing small objects like seashells.

By the 1980s, coasters had moved from practical to premium, with brands like Thirstystone turning sandstone into chic. Brands like Versace added designer names, while mixed materials turned coasters into statement pieces.

Whether it's a bar coaster from a favorite watering hole or a souvenir set from a memorable trip, many collections start almost by accident. A casual keepsake can turn into a hobby,

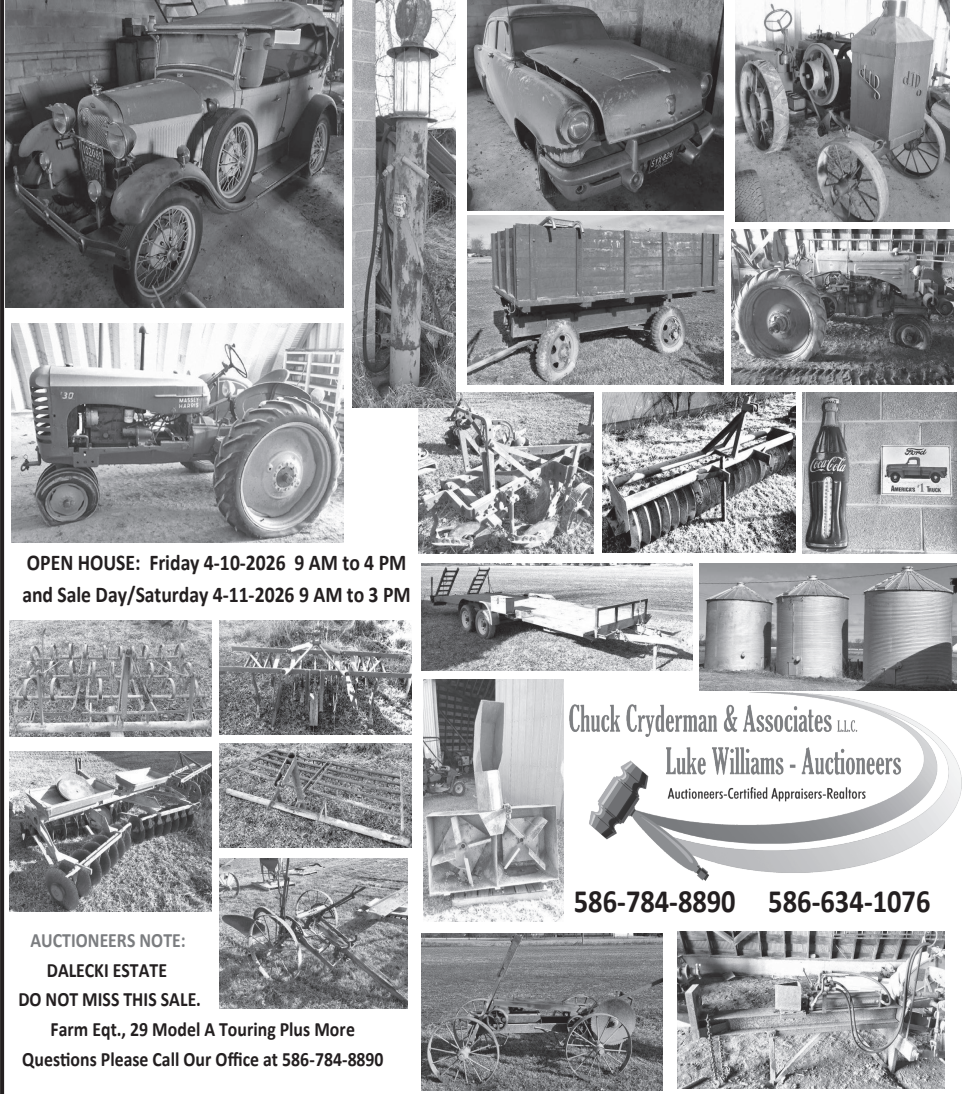

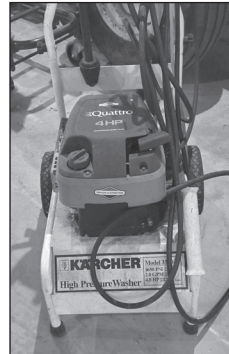

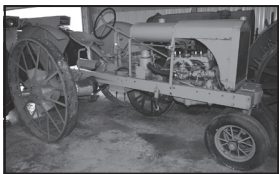

often in pursuit of some typical categories:

Breweriana – Perhaps the most popular, these coasters appeal to collectors because they preserve the heritage of popular brands and establishments often lost to time.

Tourism-Related – As coaster advertising expanded, restaurants, hotels, nightclubs, airlines, and even cruise lines joined the trend. Many doubled as travel souvenirs, attracting collectors who enjoy items tied to hospitality.

Other Advertising – Coasters commissioned by businesses beyond spirits makers and bars form another popular category. Examples include auto dealerships, soda companies, and real estate agencies.

Commemorative – Produced for special occasions or organizations, these coasters commemorate colleges, sports teams, clubs, and events ranging from athletic competitions to conventions, appealing to collectors of popular culture.

Modern Advertising Varieties – Today's brewers, distilleries, and other hospitality companies continue the coaster tradition. Beyond typical paperboard coasters, many use durable materials like slate or wood, making them unique for collectors.

And from the home décor category:

Antique and Vintage Examples – Those from the 19th to the late 20th century capture the style and themes of their eras.

Artisan-Made Pieces –

Handmade coasters, whether vintage or contemporary, created by craftspeople or Indigenous artists, offer another option and often one-of-a-kind pieces.

One appealing aspect of collecting coasters is how approachable they can be. Individuals often sell for under \$10, and sets typically go for less than \$50.

Yet rarity or other factors can inflate prices. A single antique beer coaster once fetched nearly \$1,500 on eBay, and some recent Louis Vuitton examples have exceeded \$3,000. Those from the first 70 years of the 20th century - especially brands or venues no longer around - are particularly sought. Some can exceed \$100. Some subgroups bring higher prices, like Anheuser-Busch collectors' club sets and Hummel coasters issued in the final decades of the 20th century.

Home décor sets have

their own influences. Ones made from premium materials like silver or platinum naturally command higher prices. Iconic varieties, like Art Deco and atomic-age modern, also add value for enthusiasts.

Collectors of contemporary advertising coasters enjoy a rare perk: many establishments give them away for free. Taking one or two is perfectly fine, but propriety matters - grabbing handfuls can be costly

for the business, especially when the coasters are made from anything sturdier than recycled paper.

Owners often wrestle with whether coasters should be used or kept safe. Antique paper coasters, even when well preserved, are vulnerable to moisture and other damage, so they're best stored. To help protect them, companies like Safe Collecting Supplies (www.safepub.com) offer albums specifi-

cally designed for coaster collections. Decorative coasters in sturdy materials such as metal or glass can still be enjoyed with minimal risk, letting collectors appreciate their design and function.

Drink coasters may be small, but they tell big stories. Over the decades, they've reflected shifts in design, advertising, hospitality, and home life. Their blend of history, artistry, and affordability keeps col-

lecting endlessly rewarding.

Readers interested in coaster collecting can turn to The American Breweriana Association (www.americanbreweriana.org) for resources and community support, and those focused on home décor varieties can find like-minded enthusiasts in Facebook groups dedicated to 20th-century barware.
